# **Pittsworth to Pittsburgh** in a loaded little Ces

If you're feeling a little bored with the same old this week, here's a story to stir the adventure in us all - about a chap who departed our region last week in a little plane for an island-hopping trip home to the United States.

Ross Edmondson had spent the night at Irongate, at one of Queensland's most unique accommodation options, Fig Tree Country Retreat, where visitors can make use of the airstrip if they have a plane handy.

Which Ross did.

His interest was piqued when he heard about the unique retreat Ken Edwards and Ruth Ashburner-Gorse have established, so he managed to slot in a visit before departing for New Caledonia last Friday.

He'll be island hopping across the Pacific all the way home to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in the US.

To achieve the last big stretch of his homeward flight, from Hawaii to California, every spare bit of space in his little single engine Cessna 182 will be loaded with fuel.
